

Glen's Baby Brother (RC D)

Target Phonics: or, ore: /or/

Working With Words

Phonemic Awareness Warm-Up

Blend: born, snore, cord

Segment: sore, torn, wore

Introduce/Review Target Concept

"Did you hear the /or/ sound in all of those words? Today we will study two patterns that spell the /or/ sound. Or stands for the sound /or/, like in the words *porch* and *for*. Or can come at the middle and end of the word, and even sometimes the beginning. Ore stands for the sound /or/, like in the word *store*. It comes at the end of the word. These patterns are called r-controlled vowels because the r after the vowel changes the vowel sound."

Read and Spell Words

Guide students to read blending lines.

Spell and check: tore, snore, worn.

High Frequency Words

Teach and/or review the word *would*.

Reading the Text

Before Reading: Introduce Text and Key Vocabulary

"This book is called *Glen's Baby Brother*. You'll see the word *brother* in this book—there it is in the title. You read it! In this book, Glen's new baby brother is coming home. Say *anticipate*. *Anticipate* means to expect that something will happen. Glen isn't sure what to *anticipate*, or *expect*, about his new baby brother, so he talks to Gran about it. Read to find out what Glen thinks about his new brother."

After Reading: Discuss

- "Was there anything that Glen didn't anticipate about his baby brother?"
- "How does Glen feel about his brother? How do you know?"
